

Total Homicides and Unsolved Homicides by Year*

(I added the homicide totals for 2005 - 2007.)

A lot of these numbers are iffy, and for reasons which I explain in my book they get more iffy the further back you go. But the more recent numbers are solid, and for the purposes of my book—which was to look at which murders don't get solved and why not, and what the current Cold Case Squad does to try to solve them—the numbers, even the iffy ones, are enlightening.

It's also important to note that even the solid numbers are not the true number of people murdered in New York. Some murders are classified "justifiable homicides" and are not included in the NYPD's totals. These include those committed in self defense, or when a member of the police department kills someone in the line of duty. The Office of the Chief Medical Examiner counts everything, so their totals are always higher than the NYPD's. I have more caveats and explanations at the end of this document.

The last time I was able to get a figure, which was in January of 2007, there were 9,082 unsolved murders in New York City going back to 1985. That number will go up every year because they add more than they take away. (This is not a reflection on whether or not they are doing a good job, the weight of the past is not in their favor.)

Any corrections would be greatly appreciated, but I would respectfully request that you also include your sources.

**The number of total homicides for the years, 1900-1911, 1913-1916 came from "Population, Births, Notifiable Diseases, and Deaths, Assembled for New York City, NY

1866-1936 from Official Record," compiled by Haven Emerson, MD, and published by Columbia University. Emerson got his figures from the Department of Health, so his numbers, like those from the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner, are going to be higher because they count all homicides, including justifiable homicides, etc.

***The clearance rates for the years 1969-1980, and 1983 were based on Crime Comparison figures vs the FBI Crime Index. Crime Comparison is based on the New York State Penal Code, where more deaths are classified as homicides. The NYPD has adopted the FBI Crime Index for reporting purposes, but where those figures were not available, the Crime Comparison figures were used. Those figures will always be higher.

The clearance rates for all other years are based on the NYPD Annual Reports. When the NYPD did not provide a clearance rate one year (or years), an estimate was made based on an average for that time period. The years that are based on an average: 1900-1911, 1914-1916, 1919-1922, 1925-1928, 1931-1932, and 1935-1936.

- (3) 280 were closed with arrests, 29 perpetrators committed suicide.
